

April 24, 2020 Update

What's New?

- Today, the Governor announced that current construction projects (those begun prior to the pandemic) will be allowed to resume, subject to certain safety requirements such as training, monitoring and social distancing. Enforcement of these provisions will be handled by the Washington State Department of Labor & Industries.
- [Governor's Proclamation 20-28](#) (issued March 24, 2020) was extended from April 23 to May 4, 2020. This Proclamation temporarily prohibits in-person contacts with the public that are required by the Open Public Meetings Act (OPMA) (RCW 42.30) and the Public Records Act (PRA) (RCW 42.56), suspending some statutory language that would require such contacts. This proclamation also temporarily suspends the PRA's requirements for agencies to respond to PRA requests for public records within five business days from receipt, and to maintain business hours for public inspection and copying of records for a minimum of 30 hours per week. Therefore, the May 4 City Council meeting will be held remotely and the public can attend online or listen on the telephone. Meeting information will be posted at www.cityofmlt.com/129. The city has made provisions for accepting written public comment since in-person attendance at City Council meetings is not currently allowed.
- **Governor Extends 20 Proclamations Related to COVID-19:** Governor Jay Inslee announced the extension of 20 proclamations in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. The extensions were approved by the State Legislature. The April 9, 2020 [letter](#) extends five proclamations related to long term care. The proclamations were approved to be extended until the

termination of the COVID-19 State of Emergency or May 9, 2020, whichever occurs first. The proclamation extends proclamations [20-06](#), [20-10](#), [20-16](#), [20-17](#) and [20-18](#). The resulting [proclamation](#) extends statewide orders relating to long-term care

The April 15, 2020 [letter](#) extended five proclamations. The proclamations were approved to be extended until the termination of the COVID-19 State of Emergency or May 4, 2020, whichever occurs first. The five proclamations include [20-15.1](#): Department of Licensing eye exams ([original](#)); [20-20.1](#): Department of Revenue relief from penalties, fees, interest, due dates ([original](#)); [20-21.1](#): Unemployment Insurance waiver ([original](#)); [20-23.2](#); and Ratepayer Assistance and Preservation of Essential Services ([original 20-23](#), [original 20-23.1](#))

The April 22, 2020 [letter](#) approved the extension of 10 proclamations. The proclamations were approved to be extended until the termination of the COVID-19 State of Emergency or May 4, 2020, whichever occurs first.

- **The April 30 City Council work/study session is cancelled** in compliance with the [Governor's Proclamation 20-28](#) that states business may only be conducted on items that are both "necessary and routine."

- **Washington WIC an Essential Service and Continues to be Available to Pregnant Women, New Moms, and Young Children:** WIC is the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children. WIC gives families access to nutritious foods, nutrition education and breastfeeding support, health assessments and referrals. WIC is for pregnant people, new and breastfeeding moms, infants, and children under 5. These services help diverse communities address their health needs during and after pregnancy and in early childhood. - **Companies are Hiring:** While some companies are experiencing challenges and reducing employee count, others are hiring immediately to meet new demands. - **The City of Mountlake Terrace issued a Declaration of Emergency** on Monday, April 6 following the Governor's extension of the "Stay Home, Stay Healthy" Order until May 4. Doing so allows the city to change our operating hours, work beyond normal hours, make emergency

procurements, reassign staff to tasks not normally in their job descriptions, etc. to ensure continuity of government and essential operations consistent with the orders of Governor Inslee during this pandemic.

As a result, City Hall, the Police Station and the Public Works Shop are closed to the public. The city will continue to process building and development permits, inspect essential construction activities, provide police services and maintain grounds and infrastructure.

The Recreation Pavilion is closed to the public with the exception of the city's child care programs. Playground facilities are closed. Park trails are open, subject to gathering and social distancing requirements.

Most employees at City Hall, the Public Works Shop, and the Recreation Pavilion, as well as non-commissioned personnel at the Police Station, are now separated into two work groups to work remotely or on alternating shifts to reduce the risk of broad infection at city facilities.

Police fines and payments may be placed in the Police Station payment box outside the station or mailed in to 5906 232nd Street SW, Mountlake Terrace, WA 98043.

City utility payments may be placed in the drop box outside the Redstone Corporate Center II (Interim City Hall) parking lot or mailed to 6100 219th Street SW, #200, Mountlake Terrace, WA 98043. They may also be paid online and the city's vendor is currently waiving the \$2.00 convenience

- On April 16, the Governor expanded the state’s eviction moratorium and added additional protections for residential and some commercial tenants: The Governor first proclaimed [a moratorium on evictions](#) in mid-March. The original order did not cover all living situations or every circumstance, nor did it cover commercial rentals and leases. The [new proclamation](#) extends and expands the original order through June 4th. Read more [here](#).
- **Snohomish County is No Longer Accepting Applications for the Working Washington Small Business Emergency Grant:** A Working Washington Small Business Emergency Grant program to assist small businesses impacted by the COVID-19 outbreak was made available last week. Many counties, including Snohomish County, have discontinued accepting applications at this time due to overwhelming volumes and limited staff. In total, the program has now received over 24,000 applications statewide. Washington’s officials and congressional delegation have been working on additional small business programs that may include grants in the future. - **Social Distancing Violations of “Stay Home, Stay Healthy Order”:** In summary of the Governor’s March 30 press conference regarding handling reported violations of orders on social distancing and proper business operations, please note the following:
 - People are **NOT** being asked, stopped and/or checked for identification purely for being out of their homes.
 - An individual, group or business disobeying the Governor’s order is in violation of RCW 43.06.220(5).
 - To report an ***individual*** or ***private group*** that is not following the order, people are to contact local law enforcement. For Mountlake Terrace, those calls should go through dispatch’s non-emergency number: (425) 4073999. Please DO NOT call 9-1-1 or the Police Station.

- **Snohomish County Extends Provides Some Property Tax Extensions:** Due to the financial hardships caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, Snohomish County Treasurer Brian Sullivan and Executive Dave Somers

have extended the first-half 2020 property tax deadline to June 1, 2020. *This executive order only applies to residents who pay their individual and commercial property taxes themselves, rather than through their mortgage lender.* Banks and other financial institutions that pay property taxes on behalf of their lending customers will still need to meet the original April 30 deadline. For those who can do so, Snohomish County is encouraging individual taxpayers to pay by the original April 30 deadline or as soon thereafter as possible.

- The Recreation and Parks Department is taking registration for camp care for children currently in our program as well as any children of essential workers or vulnerable children who do not have alternative care. The cost of the camp is \$170 per week for Mountlake Terrace residents. To register, please email mltrecreation@ci.mlt.wa.us. For more information, please call the Recreation Pavilion at (425) 776-9173 on weekdays between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. due to limited staffing. In compliance with the “Stay Home, Stay Healthy” Order, the Pavilion is closed for in-person information so please call or email.
- [Governor’s Proclamation 20-28](#) (issued March 24, 2020) temporarily prohibits in-person contacts with the public that are required by the Open Public Meetings Act (OPMA) (RCW 42.30) and the Public Records Act (PRA) (RCW 42.56), suspending some statutory language that would require such contacts. This proclamation also temporarily suspends the PRA’s requirements for agencies to respond to PRA requests for public records within five business days from receipt, and to maintain business hours for public inspection and copying of records for a minimum of 30 hours per week. It is effective from March 24, 2020 until midnight, May 4, 2020. Please read the proclamation for details and to see the list of citations to the specific OPMA and PRA statutes or portions of statutes that are temporarily suspended.
- **“Stay Home, Stay Healthy” Order In Effect March 25, 2020 Until Midnight May 4, 2020, Unless Extended:** Starting Wednesday, March 25, 2020, most businesses will be closed statewide with the exception of [essential businesses](#) and key government functions including the City of Mountlake Terrace. The State defines “Essential Critical Infrastructure Workers” as personnel who are needed to maintain continuity of operations of essential critical infrastructure sectors and additional sectors as the State Public Health Officer may designate as critical to protect health and well-being of all Washingtonians. - **Drive-thru testing available by appointment** for high-risk Snohomish County residents with COVID-19 symptoms, including those who work in healthcare, public safety or critical infrastructure, now have another option for free testing. City Hall employees are placing a group lunch order each day to a different Mountlake Terrace restaurant to try and help our local businesses.
- The city recognizes there is uncertainty at this time and realizes that some utility customers may be worried about paying their water bill. Therefore, in line with Governor Inslee's request of March 18 and his extension, **the City of Mountlake Terrace will postpone shut offs of water service to customers for nonpayment through May 4**. This action may be extended in the future, and no late fees or penalties will apply during this time. We encourage customers to continue to make their utility payments or to call Utility Billing at (425) 744-6214 to make payment arrangements if they are unable to pay at this time.
- **SW Transfer Station Changes:** Effective March 28, 2020, Snohomish County closed all of its Solid Waste facilities and programs and announced they would reopen to *mechanical-unload customers only* on weekdays on Monday, March 30. Additionally, Snohomish County announced the transfer stations reopened on Saturdays only, starting April 4, to hand-unload/self-haul customers with only household garbage (see their [webpage](#) for criteria) during the duration of the health crisis. Rural drop box sites and the Household Hazardous Waste Facility will remain closed. Transfer station hours are now changed to 7 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Credit cards or account transactions only during the health crisis – no cash or checks. - Snohomish County has launched a COVID-19 **Emergency Sheltering Program** to help those most at risk of exposure to COVID-19. The funds will target those who are experiencing homelessness and are parents with children, veterans, or other vulnerable individuals. For more information, visit this [website](#).

- **U.S. Tax Filing Deadline Extended to July 15, 2020** - All taxpayers and businesses will have until July 15, 2020 to file and make payments without interest or penalties.
